

Sample Data Collection for Plan Prioritization

The following 3 Strategies were taken at random from the Neighborhood Plan to develop the Plan Prioritization Data Collection Guidelines. After walking through these Strategies we uncovered some issues and questions that arise from the Guidelines. We'll use these Strategies at the Kick-off meeting to review the Guidelines one more time before we split off into sub-teams.

R-TS8: Encourage Roosevelt High School and the Calvary Christian Assembly Church to work with SDOT to develop institutional parking restrictions to protect against commuters usurping on-street parking on N.E. 66th and 68th streets for the school and on N.E. 68th and 69th streets for the church.

What does this mean?

Action item: Find out what this means. Does this mean develop a park and ride?

Action Item: Document policies, reasons why this does/doesn't exist?

Survey: "Ample On-street Parking", "Accessibility to Transit."
