Pedaling 4 Preparedness (P4P) Awareness Campaign

A bicycle can be a significant resource in a time of disaster. Whether it's used to evacuate before a tsunami, to maneuver though disrupted streets following an earthquake, or to transport food, water, and first aid supplies to survivors after a hurricane, bikes have proven to be a feasible and accessible tool/resource.

Ilyssa Plumer, founder of Pedaling 4 Preparedness (P4P) had this "ahal" moment when biking home from work on Bike to Work Day in 2012. She suddenly realized how easy it would be to combine two of her biggest passions: disaster preparedness and biking. At first she thought the idea was silly, but as she spoke with those around her, while also hearing of powerful stories where bikes were being used in disaster response (i.e transporting resources after Hurricane Sandy, when all other transit was down), the more her vision grew.

Ilyssa is geared up for her second year of P4P during the month of September (aka National Preparedness Month)! RNAT concerns itself with five transportation issues: **parking, biking, buses, pedestrians and traffic flow**. We currently have about eight active members and so focus on the first two issues. More members would enable us to address other issues, so if Transport is your thing...join us.


Parking will be a big issue in the next 10 years as we get more new buildings, more businesses and a train service. We feel it is important to act before problems arise. Both businesses and residents will or do have significant challenges with parking and we have identified strategies to maximize current parking wisely. A couple of parking hotspots have already arisen on NE 62nd and NE 66th, so we have been working with all parties to develop fair and smart solutions to current challenges. This coming year we also want to engage Roosevelt High School as they are an important part of the puzzle.

The city wants to encourage more of us to bike for work, errands and pleasure. Their Bicycle Master Plan features a protected bike lane from 35th NE to Green Lake, and one option is for it to go along 65th. In the past year we have explored the various route options and our goal this year is to choose, as a neighborhood, which makes the most sense overall. Even though construction of such a bike lane is not likely to happen for a few years, we need to have our ideas and arguments in place so our voice will be strong.

RNAT meets at 7pm on the second Thursday of the month at rotating public venues. On September 11th we will meet at Casa Patron and you are invited to join us.

RNA Fundraising and Grants

The Fundraising and Grants Committee has several opportunities for grants this year. The main focus will be the Only in Seattle Grant from the Office of Economic Development. This would allow the neighborhood to continue the work in progress at Weedin Place. The Roosevelt Business Group along with the Weedin Place Steering Committee will be determining the direction of the grant which is due late October. Other grants are available through the Department of Neighborhoods - deadlines dependent on grant. Projects funded by these grants are community driven initiatives that have a public good. Roosevelt Neighborhood Design Guidelines

Our design guidelines are the backbone of the City's Design Review Program. The guidelines are used by the Design Review Boards and the DPD staff to assess the merits of a project. They direct designers and project reviewers to look closely at the neighborhood and its character to design new buildings that enhance their surroundings. The Roosevelt Design Guidelines, will be used in conjunction with citywide design guidelines, and these are critical so that we can insure important attributes of our community are preserved and enhanced.

Developers are currently using the version of the guidelines found here:

These were created in 2000 and reformatted in 2014 to match the updated Citywide Guidelines structure.

In 2012 a group of RNA members and city staff began a revision process, compiling a wide-ranging set of comments/suggestions about the structure and purpose of the Roosevelt guidelines, and creating an initial draft. This process stalled late 2012 but is being restarted with plans for meetings this fall.


We are inviting those who took part in the past reviews, as well as anyone who is interested in taking part in the upcoming review, to add their comments, so that the RNA can move forward and adopt Design Guidelines that will serve as a model for our community, for the next decade and beyond. We plan to meet in October to review a new draft of the Roosevelt Guidelines.
